## MRS. RUTH GLEAVES<sup>15</sup>

'Mrs. Ruth Gleaves Celebrates 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday with Schoolgirl Friend' Date: Oct. 13, 1940<sup>16</sup>.

Quietly at her beautiful country home near the Hermitage, located on a knoll overlooking one of those beautiful valleys of Middle Tennessee, Mrs. Ruth Gleaves is today celebrating her ninetieth birthday.....

On Sunday her **daughter**, <u>Miss Kate Gleaves</u>, invited a few friends to an old-fashioned home gathering in honor of the occasion. Mrs. Gleaves received her guests in the room to which she came as a **bride 65 years ago**.

.....seated at the table were Mrs. Gleaves' daughter, **Miss Kate Gleaves** and **Mrs. Mai Gleaves**, her **grandson Frank and James Gleaves**, Mrs. H. Morgan, Mr. and Mrs. Mayhew Dodson, Mr. and Mrs. George Howard, Mr. and Mrs. Littrell Rust and daughters Margaret Ann and Emmaline and Mr. Clarence J. Trantham. A number of the neighbors called during the evening to congratulate Mrs. Gleaves.

Mrs. Gleaves was born on what is now known as Wilson Pike, some 5 or 6 miles from Brentwood in Wilson County, Tennessee. She was the niece of James H. Wilson, one of the wealthiest landed proprietors in the county at that time......

Her guests during those years (1861-1865) ranged from those matchless heroes of the confederacy, Gens. Morgan and Forrest, to the most despised Yankee Private. Once particularly she outwitted the Yankee by successfully hiding a handsome young colt in a newly dug milk cellar near the house...

## THE GLEAVES HOUSE<sup>18</sup>

An old man had carefully written out the details of his will, but after his death <u>his son</u> had turned the inheritance of others to his own use. The actions of the <u>son</u> allowed him more wealth than he might otherwise have had, but his descendants were eventually deprived of what had been gained by his greed, and the lives of others were diminished in the process. A house was built, and after the years had passed into well over a century, it became one of the last remaining structures of a bygone age. With its classical design, its individuality, and the quality of its craftsmanship and construction, the house stood in increasing contrast to more modern dwellings, and by revealing such unmistakable change, its presence provided insights into the direction of that change. The house had stood long enough to become part of the cultural heritage of the neighborhood and of the region, but, as had happened with an earlier inheritance, it was not to be passed on to its proper recipients.

William Stuart<sup>19</sup> was born in Fife-Shire, Scotland, around the middle of the eighteenth century, and after coming to America, he apparently lived for a number of years in North Carolina. He arrived in the Cumberland wilderness with his family by early 1780, and although he received a land grant of 640 acres in 1785, it was several years before he would be able to do much more than clear a few acres of land. Indian attacks ravaged the Cumberland settlements until 1795, and it was probably very soon after the end of the fighting that Stuart moved onto his land, which was located along the east bank of Stones River and across from the place which would become known as Clover Bottom. In addition to Stuart, his wife Margaret, and their son William, those moving to the Stones River tract included a slave woman named Letitia and nicknamed Lettuce, and her four children. A house was built on the southern part of the land, and the elder William Stuart supervised his farm until his death in late 1807 or early 1808. A few months before his death, Stuart had written a will which not only provided that, after the death of his wife, Lettuce and her children would be emancipated, but also instructed that they would receive all of his livestock, his farming implements, his household utensils and most of his land.

Lettuce and her children should have received their inheritance the following summer with the death of Margaret Stuart, but the younger William Stuart would not abide by his father's will and kept the family in slavery. The children, who may have been fathered by the elder Stuart, remained together for a time, but Lettuce and her two daughters, Nell and Celia, were eventually sold and taken away. Her two sons, David and Moses, were kept by Stuart as slaves until 1842, and after moving to Williamson County, they were ultimately freed by a court decision. Before his death in the late 1840s, William Stewart, who had changed the spelling of his name, had given much of the northern part of his father's grant to his daughter and her husband, but David and Moses, with the help of William (B.) Gleaves, a former neighbor, pursued their inheritance in court. Almost a half century had passed since the death of old William Stuart when the Chancery Court of Davidson County ruled that the two former slaves were entitled to almost 500 acres of the Stuart tract, but by the time of the decree, both their mother and their sister Nell were dead, and their sister Celia, who had been taken to Alabama years earlier, had never been heard from again. In addition to its ruling on the land, the court also ordered that David and Moses should be paid over \$12,000 for the rent of their property from the time of the elder Stuart's death, and it decreed that they were to receive over \$8000 for the work they had performed during that period. David and Moses who had moved to Missouri, chose not to live on the land which they had finally received, and in 1854 a large part of it was sold to a brother of William Gleaves.

Thomas Gleaves was born in Virginia in 1771, grew up during the Revolutionary War, and had come from Wythe County, Virginia, to Davidson County by 1796, when he bought a tract of land on the east side of Stones River near the land of William Stuart. He married Sally Smith the following year, and their first child, William, who would grow up to help two disenfranchised slaves reclaim their inheritance, was born soon afterward. Thomas and Sally Gleaves would have a number of other children, and in addition to William, both John, who was born around 1801, and Felix, born around 1816, would have connections to the Stuart tract. Felix Gleaves was still growing up on his father's farm when an older brother, John married in 1828 and by the time Felix married eight years later, John had several children. Sally Gleaves died in the 1840s, not long before the death of her husband Thomas, and in 1854, her son, Felix Gleaves who had taken care of his father in his last years and had been rewarded with a large share of his estate, bought 128 acres of the Stuart tract from the former Stuart slaves, David and Moses. Felix Gleaves probably built the stylish two-story house soon after buying the land and apparently lived there with his wife until the autumn of 1860, when the property was sold to his nephews, Richard and John Bell Gleaves, sons of his older brother John, who had died in the early 1850s.

At the beginning of the Civil War the household apparently included <u>Richard and John Bell Gleaves</u>, their widowed mother, and a younger sister and brother, and although the farm was small, there were some twenty slaves living on the place. Although the house was not damaged during the war, the Gleaves farm suffered significant losses to foragers, and of those who had been living in the house in 1860, only <u>John Bell Gleaves</u> was still living there by the end of the decade. In 1866, the year before the death of his brother Richard, <u>John Bell Gleaves</u> had married Annie Ridley, a descendant of early Davidson County settler <u>George</u> Ridley, and by 1870 two daughters had been born in the house. Four additional children were born over the next few years, but <u>Annie Ridley Gleaves</u> died in 1876, and her husband's unmarried cousin, <u>Charity Gleaves</u>, came to help him raise the children. Most of the Gleaves children grew up and left home during the latter part of the century, but two daughters, <u>Carrie and Blanche</u>, remained in the house after the <u>death of John Bell Gleaves in 1909</u>. The house stayed in the family for a number of years, and in 1967, after several changes in ownership, the Gleaves house became the property of <u>Jerry D. Nelson</u>. The house remained in Nelson's possession for nearly twenty years, but in the spring of 1986 Nelson sold it to the Chapel Road-SASA <u>Apartment Company</u>. <sup>22</sup> a business concern located in Texas, and the Gleaves House was razed soon afterward.

## **Davidson County, Tennessee – Chancery Court Record**<sup>23</sup> – (freed slave)

(Lawsuit referenced in the Gleaves House article)

#### Complainants are:

David & Moses, persons of color who sue by their next friend, William B. Gleaves

#### Defendants:

John Moore for himself as representative of William Stewart, the younger, deceased Drusilla Stewart, widow of William Stewart the younger; Rodney Earhart & Mary his wife, formerly Mary Brooks; Christopher Brooks & Elizabeth Earhart, widow of Nimrod Earhart

Cause heard on 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> days of May 1848

William Stewart, the elder, a native of Scotland ...died Sept 6, 1807...a resident of Davidson County, Tennessee, Last will proved in Davidson County Court at Jan. 1808 session. Admin. with Will annexed – to William Stewart, the younger, a nephew of the testator. The Will said William Stewart, the elder, directed that complainants (David & Moses) should have their freedom and together with their mother Letitia and their 2 sisters Nell and Celia should be tenants in common of a certain portion of a tract of land...together with all his household and farming utensils and stock of every kind.

William, the younger, returned an inventory of William, the elder's, estate: The <u>inventory included the said slaves!</u>.....said slaves were kept in slavery by the said William Stewart, the administrator, as <u>part of</u> the estate...<u>until Feb. 4, 1842</u> when 2 of them (the complainants) filed their bill ......William Stewart, the younger, administrator, has departed this life and John Moore is representative.

This Court orders that <u>William B. Gleaves</u>, next friend of the complainants be appointed trustee of the last Will and testament of the said William Stewart, dec., whose duty it shall be to apply to the County Court of Davidson County, by petition praying them to grant the assent of the State to the Emancipation of complainants......allowed til July 1848

#### OLD HICKORY SHOPPING CENTER BURNS

Old Hickory Shopping Center will be missed by a lot of people. It was built on land purchased from DuPont Plant, but was originally a parcel of land owned by Michael Gleaves. He was the first white settler in Old Hickory, Tennessee.

Michael Gleaves was born in 1754 in Cripple Creek, Virginia and came to Mansker's Fort under the command of Captain Donelson about 1779. He entered the Colonial Army and fought in the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780 and then returned to Mansker's Fort where he married Rachel. He received a 640 acre Land Grant for his service (Land Grant #26). This land was across the river from Mansker's Fort in Jones-Hadley Bend which later became known as Old Hickory, Tennessee. He bought 640 more adjoining acres, and at a Sheriff's sale purchased another 100 acres, giving him a total of 1300 acres. He was a wealthy man at that date and one of the first seven men to pay taxes in Davidson County, Tennessee in the year 1791. This land was occupied by the DuPont Powder Plant during World War I and later became the site of the DuPont Rayon and Cellophane Plants. Old Hickory Shopping Center was built in 1948 on part of the original 1300 acres that was later owned by Dupont.

Michael Gleaves' nephew (Thomas Harvey Gleaves) was my gggg-grandfather and followed his uncle Michael Gleaves from Cripple Creek, Virginia to Tennessee.

My father started work for DuPont in 1935 and met my mother at the Old Dormitory in Lakewood, Tennessee where many early DuPont employees lived. He worked at the Cellophane plant on this property until it closed.

I remember as a child going to the Theater in Old Hickory. It cost 10 cents to get in and for a quarter you would have popcorn and a coke. Kids would leave the movie and go to the Drug Store in Old Hickory Shopping Center and have a soda. Those were the good old days.

The burning of Old Hickory Shopping Center is a great loss to many people and a piece of history gone forever.

## MOUNT JULIET, WILSON COUNTY, TENNESSEE

Tradition says the village of Mount Juliet was named for Julia Gleaves, which is easily disproved. Julia Jennings Baird, a widow, did not live in the area until she married Guy Gleaves, 29 September 1851. During the War Between the States (1861-1865), she was regarded as a 'ministering angel'. She was a well respected member of the community, but the name 'Mount Juliet' had already surfaced before the War and before she moved to the area.

Tradition also says the name Mount Juliet seems to have appeared about 1835. There is <u>no</u> evidence to support this date. In the 1840-50 Census, the area is referred to only as the 25<sup>th</sup> Civil District. The post office for the 25<sup>th</sup> District in 1860 was Rural Hill, Tennessee (Suggs Creek area). It is possible the name Mount Juliet was first suggested as a name for a house, and the surrounding community gradually took on the name. Mount Juliet High School was incorporated about 1855. In 1851-1852 several members of the community moved to Texas. These families, the Wrights, Hamiltons, and Hewgleys were among those traveling west and established the name Mount Juliet in Travis County, Texas.

Tradition also tells us the area first known as Mount Juliet was located on a mount, facing the old Lebanon-Nashville Road (Old Lebanon Dirt Road), near the Eagle Tavern. This tavern was a stopover for many a weary traveler and remained a public inn until about 1850. Was this spot manufactured to agree with the Julia Gleaves tradition? Possibly, for there are other 'mounts' in close proximity, but we can conclude this is the general area.

There were people of Irish descent in the district, but only one Irishman in the 25<sup>th</sup> Civil District in the 1850 Census. His name was Edward Bodily, a stone mason by trade and born ca 1814 in Ireland. Only one who had seen the countryside of Thomastown, Ireland could possibly see the similarities to his newly adopted land. Who else but one who had seen the estates of Mount Juliet, Noreland, and the River Nore could suggest the name Mount Juliet and possibly Moreland (Noreland) Road? Although Stoner Creek is not the River Nore, it does meander below the 'mounts' much like the River Nore of Ireland. In a video I received from Martin P. Nicholson, Managing Director of Mount Juliet in Ireland, the topographies of the two regions are astoundingly similar. Even today in the mind's eye, you can envision the mount Juliet of 1840-1850. Although it is veritably impossible to prove that Edward Bodily suggested the name, there is circumstantial evidence.

Bodily arrived in America sometime <u>before</u> 28 October 1848. On this date, he made bond to marry the daughter of a prominent member of the community. The lady of his affection was Abraham Heuguley's youngest daughter, Almedia. Abraham possibly did not approve, but the marriage took place a few months later, 8 March 1849. Abraham, not to be outdone, made his will 18 June 1849. He named another son-in-law, Samuel Hamilton, to act as trustee for his daughter Almedia Bodily. Hamilton was to see that all property described in his will for Almedia stayed in the county of Wilson and the State of Tennessee. If she were to die without issue, the property was to go to Abraham's other children.

Whether Abraham considered his new son-in-law an 'opportunist' or just didn't approve of him is still evident five years later. On 10 February 1854, he added a codicil to his will making William L. Young, another son-in-law, trustee for daughter Almedia Bodily. Samuel Hamilton who married Sarah Heuguley, was already in Mount Juliet, Texas.

The surname BODLE can be found ten miles east of Thomastown in 1835. The information came from The Kilkenny Archaeological Society in Ireland. Edward Bodily was evidently a good stone mason, as much of his work can still be seen today. Research continues as more questions surface. Could Edward Bodily have been one of the many Irishmen who came to work on the Tennessee State capital. From the Tennessee State Capitol Historic Structure Report: 'As early as July 1845, Strickland had advertised for a number of stone masons to whom fair wages would be paid'. Did Bodily build the fire place and chimney in one or more of the houses on the mount? Did he suggest a name for the house? Mount Juliet, in Ireland was a <a href="https://www.nor.village">house</a>, not a town or village. Whomever Edward Bodily was, he is the only person in 1845-1850 who could have possibly seen <a href="https://www.nor.village">hoth</a> Mount Juliets.
