

CASE OF HOYT.

The case of the Commonwealth against W. R. Myers, &c , for shooting D. M. Hoyt, again came up before the Mayor on Monday. Hoyt's physicians, (Drs. Carmichael and Mills,) replied to a question put by the Mayor, that they regarded the condition of their patient as more critical than it had been—a fungus having formed on the brain. The counsel for the accused, who said that their clients were anxious for a trial, then moved that the Court adjourn to Hoyt's bed-side and conduct the examination there—excluding all persons but the parties and counsel. They said that it was usual to adopt such a course—and Hoyt's physicians had expressed the opinion that, from the composure which he exhibited, the investigation would do him no injury. The counsel added, however, that, as a matter of course, the examination of Hoyt would be a searching one. After some consultation, the Mayor declined the proposition; and at the suggestion of the counsel for the accused, the case was continued over till next Monday, with the understanding that if the Mayor should think proper, he might hold the examination in the mean time, upon giving the accused six hour's notice. Last evening Hoyt was a good deal worse. It is now thought he cannot live.—*Rich. Enquirer.*
