

Friday Moming: Quality Inn to Fiddlers Grove 945 E. Baddour Parkway, Lebanon, TN about 15 miles, 25 minutes

- Leave the Quality Inn and turn left onto S. Mt Juliet Road.
- 2. Immediately get into the right hand lane.
- 3. Take the ramp onto I-40 E.
- 4. Take exit 239B (about 14 miles)



- 5. Merge onto US-70 W/Sparta Pike toward Lebanon.
- 6. In .8 miles bear right onto East Baddour Parkway
- 7. go to 945 E. Baddour Parkway, turn right Into James E. Ward Agricultural Center to the main entrance
- 8. Go through the main gate and follow the Gleaves signs [if the signs are missing, then straight ahead up the hill (between the buildings), swing right near the white picket fence & park near the Arcade].



LOG CABIN (Now at Fiddler's Grove, Lebanon, Tenn.)

<u>Property and Cabin first owned by Gleaves Family - and probably constructed by them</u>

John Donelson of the County of Tennessee <u>640 acres</u> - \$600 – written 1/11/1796 <u>To</u>: Thomas Gleaves...of Wythe Co. Virginia Book D, Page 21 Recorded 7/16/1796 Situated in Davidson Co. and adjoining the EAST of William Stewart's preemption and on both sides of sinking? Branch of Stones Creek.... (No other identifying remarks...)

He [Thomas] sold 335 acres to his brother, Absalom, in 1805. This land was located around Central Pike and Old Hickory Blvd. He is buried in a cemetery behind the Apartment Complex (Burning Tree Apts). This was Thomas Gleaves' HOME. —he was born in Va. 1771, married Sally Smith in Davidson Co., Tenn. March 1797.

<u>However, Thomas Gleaves also purchased 374 acres from John Crozier – 7/3/1819</u> (Recorded 3/9/1820)...Book N, P.431 - on waters of Stones River.

He gave <u>166 Acres</u> to son <u>James R. Gleaves</u> (1823) (Bk. Q.P. 388) and <u>208 Acres</u> to son, **Wm. B. Gleaves** (in 1827) (BK R. P.408). (<u>in each</u> deed, he says <u>this land</u> is <u>part of the tract purchased from John Crozier</u>) (166 ac + 208 ac = 374 ac....this is ALL of the Crozier Tract.)

What happened to the 166 acres deeded to James R. Gleaves?

Bk. 16, P.28 (recorded 5/1/1852) - James R. gave to son, Edmond F. Gleaves 42 acres (Edmond born 11/9/1827 Edmond married 3/3/1853 – died 1902.

Edmond sold to his brother, John Robertson Gleaves – Bk. 26, P 449...21 Acres Edmond sold to his brother, Wm. C. Gleaves...Bk 26, P. 449 21 acres (\$600.00)

Bk. 16, P.28 (recorded 5/1/1852) - James R. gave to son, Wm. C. Gleaves...42 Acres (Wm C. born 1/7/1827 Wm. C...died 6/6/1909 ...married 3/8/1849)

James R. Gleaves <u>sold 12 more acres</u> to son, Wm. C. Gleaves - \$330.00 (Bk. 26, P.450, recorded 5/15/1857) (Wm C. died 6/6/1909)

(beg. At stake James Mathis N. E. corner, running N. 32 poles to a chinquipin oak; W. 70 poles to cedar stump in Ward's line; 33 poles to a hickory; thence with Mathis line 70 poles to the beginning).

AND

Wm C. Gleaves sold <u>12 Acres to his brother, JAMES FRANKLIN GLEAVES</u> (Bk. 29, P.594) (9/16/1859? (1857?) (Amt. not stated) "Beg. at stake James Mathis NE corner; N. 32 poles to a chinquapin oak; W. 70 poles to a cedar stump in Ward's line thence 33 poles to a hickory Ward's SE corner in Mathis line; E. with Mathis line 70 poles to beginning." (James F. Gleaves was born 3/17/1838 and married 10/4/1857..died 5/15/1862 at Camp Butler, Illinois) (HE may have been a Prisoner of War – Civil War)

Where is 12-acre tract (with the LOG CABIN)?

From research of this family, it is known that <u>James Franklin Gleaves</u> "died intestate many years ago". At the time John Ewen Hagar purchased this tract on 3/24/1909, the deed (Book 377, page 382) states:

"Being the same land conveyed by W. C. Gleaves to James F. Gleaves by Deed of record in Book 29, Page 594. Said James F. Gleaves died intestate many years

ago leaving as his only heirs at law 2 children –said E.N. Gleaves and J. M. Gleaves"

(E.N. Gleaves (Edward Nathaniel – b. 1/13/1861 – d. 11/14/1921)

(J. M. Gleaves (James Monroe – b. 10/4/1858 – d. 8/21/1940)

It is located in the old 4th district of Davidson Co. (now the 12th)...adjoining the property of Frances Hagar Bruce, 5633 S. New Hope Rd., Hermitage, Tenn...lying EAST of her lands.

It is definite the land has been owned by:

- John Crozier who sold to Thomas Gleaves 7/3/1819
- Thomas Gleaves who gave to son, James R. Gleaves 10/24/1823
- James R. Gleaves who sold to his son, William Carroll Gleaves 5/15/1857
- Wm. C. Gleaves who sold to his brother, James Franklin Gleaves 9/11/1857 or 1859?
- James Franklin Gleaves who still owned it when he died (5/15/1862)
- Heirs of James Franklin Gleaves -sold to John Ewen Hagar 3/24/1909
- Heirs of John Ewen Hagar –sold to Emmett Guill Hagar 8/18/1927 (Bk. 741, P.428)
- Emmett Guill Hagar who still owned it when he died 1/3/1963

WHEN was the log cabin constructed? Unknown – WHAT WE DO KNOW:

John Ewen Hagar purchased the property (with the Cabin) on 3/24/1909. Emmett G. Hagar and Nova Jenkins Hagar married Nov. 3, 1912. This was their first home. The condition of the cabin at that time is not known. **Rumor** has it that originally the cabin had only a dirt floor. Pauline H. Wells, their eldest child, says she was too young to remember – and no one recalls their mother mentioning it. (Only 1 other child was born in the Cabin: Lillian Roberta Hagar (4/8/1916 – died June 1917). Emmett & Nova Hagar moved to a house 300 yards North before August 1917. Two sons were born at that location. The remaining 8 were born at 5015 John Hagar Rd. (Hermitage, TN.)

Hilda recalls it having been mentioned that the kitchen was "out back of the house". Louise H. Davis in her book "Precious Memories" states that Wray Hagar advised that the former log cabin kitchen was later moved to his grandfather's (John E. Hagar) yard. (Property later owned by Wray Hagar's father, Thomas E. Hagar. It became a smokehouse or Sausage House and in later years, their "wash house". It is standing as of 2010.)

Hilda also recalls that as a child when they worked in the crops around the old house that there were floor joists and at least a partial floor up and downstairs as they often spread peas, etc. to dry. Therefore, she believes it had a <u>wood floor</u> when her parents lived there. Hilda has done quite a bit of family research and nothing about the age of the Cabin can be found. It is her opinion from looking at the Deeds and various dates of marriages and deaths that the following may be a good estimate:

It is **doubtful** there was a Cabin on the property at the time John Crozier sold it to Thomas Gleaves in 1819. (Thomas Gleaves did not live on the 374 acres he purchased from Crozier. We know Thomas lived on land in the area of Central Pike and Old Hickory Blvd. and is buried on that same land.)

It should be noted that <u>James R.</u> Gleaves became owner of this land in <u>Oct</u> <u>1823</u>. (given to him by his father, Thomas Gleaves.) (James R. and Eliza Wood married Jan. 1823.) <u>It is possible he erected the log cabin at that time</u>, <u>becoming their first home</u>. It is known James R. lived in a large 2 story log house at least ½ mile East of the cabin land and at the far end (East) of his tract of land. He was the first to be buried in the cemetery near his home, the cemetery facing Earhart Road. (However, it is not known when he might have built this house.)

If not built by James R. Gleaves, it was <u>probably</u> built by one of the sons who later owned this tract of land:...William C. Gleaves or James Franklin Gleaves.

William C. had married 3/8/1849 and bought the land in 5/1857. James Franklin had married Oct 1857 and bought the land in 1857 (or 1859).

If I had to make a wild guess as to when the Cabin was constructed...it would be either 1823 (by James R. & Eliza)...or about 1857 (by either William C. or James Franklin Gleaves)

This is a list of James R. Gleaves' 12 children:

In 1938 the Cabin was disassembled by Mr. Hagar and 2 sons, Henderson and Ewell and moved to another tract of land owned by Emmett G. Hagar on S. New Hope Rd. (near #5633). At that time a cedar log kitchen was added across the rear of the original one room. From 1938 until 1960s three of their children spent their earliest married lives there. (Henderson, Lucille and John). Other Hagar cousins also made this their early home. Lucille and husband, Bill Hall, made major repairs...screening the front porch and removing mud daubing and using cement daubing.

In 1969 Mrs. Hagar sold the cabin to Glenn George for the unheard of price of \$50.00. Before selling, she did not consult with any of her children, leading one to believe she was coerced into making a hasty decision. It was moved to 13100 Lebanon Rd., near Green Hill Rd. in Wilson County. It was partially reconstructed for the storage of Mrs. George's antiques. The kitchen was not re-built. In December 1996 the George Estate sold the property, including the Cabin. The next move for this old house was in 1997-1998 to its present location in FIDDLER'S GROVE on the grounds of the Wilson County Fairgrounds.

NOTE: When property sold <u>to</u> J.E. Hagar 3/24/1909 (Book 377, page 382) dimensions shown as: "Beg. at stake, James Mathews N.E. corner running N. 32 poles to a Chinquipin oak, thence W. 70 poles to cedar stump in Wards old line; So. 33 poles to Hickory Ward's SE corner in said Matthews Line; thence with said line E. 70 poles to The beginning ...containing 12 acres"...refers to Bk. 29, page 594.

NOTE #2: Mrs. Emmett G. Hagar (Nova) happens to be the great-granddaughter of James Robertson Gleaves & Eliza Wood Gleaves. Her grandmother, Martha Ann Virginia Gleaves Jenkins, was their daughter – who married Henry Thomas Jenkins. We are connected to this Land on the side of both our parents!


Hagar-George Cabin

Family records show the original cabin was built in 1820 by John Crozier. John Ewen Hagar acquired the cabin and 12 acres of land in 1823 for \$250.00. Emmett and Nova Hagar, son of John Hagar, inherited the cabin in 1919 and raised 12 children in the dirt floored cabin. He moved the cabin to a larger farm and added a floor to the cabin and an attached kitchen in 1938.


Mr. Glenn George acquired the cabin in the 1960's for \$50.00 and relocated it to the Lebanon Road in Wilson County. In 1996, the George Estate sold the property.

Mr. and Mrs. David Braunscheidel donated the cabin to Fiddlers Grove in 1998.





- Turn into Burning Tree
 apartments entrance up on the hill
 next to entrance to Jack in The
 Box.
- 2, Go up the hill and turn left at the Office complex
- Then turn on the first road on the right. The Thomas Gleaves
 Cemetery is just ahead on the left.

Note: The streets within the Burning Tree complex do not have street names.

Please note that parking here is a problem, so just park the best place you can and if we are blocking someone be prepared to move your vehicle.



To Absalom Gleaves Cemetery

- 4. Continue straight pass Thomas Gleaves Cemetery
- 5. Drive to the end where the street turns right down a hill.
- 6. At the bottom of the hill turn left into road marked "G" on the complex map.

Note: This street is a dead end.

7. Park along the right edge of the street and we will go through the trees and fence line on the right.

The entrance to this cemetery is off Central Pike but due to the danger in getting in and out I think it best to enter from Burning Tree complex. George and I have trouble every time we use the Central Pike entrance which is the only way we can go for mowing. We don't want to put anyone of us in danger.

Notes:

- Gleaves family members *currently* care for this cemetery.
- This cemetery has been difficult to name since several markers are missing or have been destroyed. Besides the four graves listed above, there are several large stone slabs and 62 fieldstones that cannot be identified; these may be either footstones or headstones.
- The Thomas Gleaves, who owned this land and is referred here, was born March 18, 1771 in Cripple Creek, Wythe County, Virginia and died 1848-49-in Davidson County, Tennessee. He married Sarah (Sallie) Smith on March 13, 1797 in Davidson County, Tennessee and he was the older brother of Absalom Gleaves.
- A large monument existed several years ago and was thought to be the grave of Thomas Gleaves. Only a base remains today.
- Reasons to believe that this cemetery should be named for Thomas Gleaves:
- 1. The cemetery is on the land that Thomas Gleaves owned. His land adjoined that of Absalom Gleaves and the Stewart family on the other side. Absalom's property ran back toward New Hope Baptist church. Absalom's son gave an acre of the land that he had received from his father to New Hope Baptist church. The Stewart family property was off Dodson Chapel Rd. going in the opposite direction. For Thomas' property to have joined Absalom's and the Stewart property, it would have had to be the property in between and that would include the property where Burning Tree Apts. is located. Thomas had the following land:
 - o 640 acres Source: Deed Book D, page 21 640 acres from Donelson
 - 187 acres Source: Deed Book I, page 416
 - o 374 acres Source: Deed Book N, page 431
 - o 22 acres Source: Deed Book Q, page 208
- 2. He gave land to his sons:

- o James Robertson Gleaves (166 acres). James R. Gleaves built his home on this land and gave part of it for the Gleaves-Clements Cemetery.
- John G. Gleaves (145 acres). This land is on Mill Rd. where the John G. Gleaves Cemetery is located and is about 2 blocks as the crow flies from Burning Tree Apts.
- William B. Gleaves (208 acres)
- 3. Thomas had (121 acres) of the above tract plus the Baker tract left which he gave to Felix R. Gleaves and Benjamin F. Gleaves.
 - o Felix received the land adjoining his brother John G.
 - "and the balance of my land on which I now live and all the Balance of the Baker tract of land not given to Felix; I give to my son Benjamin F. Gleaves." This means that Benjamin F. received the part where Burning Tree Apts. is located.
 - Source: Will Book 14, Page 490-493-Davidson Co., Tenn. Written Dec. 5, 1846-proved April 1849.
- 4. It is not known for sure that the missing tombstone was Thomas'. But it is reasoned if Thomas owned the land next to his brother Absalom and at the time he made his will he was living on that land, then he would be buried there. He willed this land to his son Benjamin F. Gleaves. Benjamin F. Gleaves has a son buried in the cemetery at Burning Tree Apt. on land that he received in his father's will.
- 5. Thomas' sons John G. and James Robertson Gleaves have average size markers in their respective cemeteries, but Thomas' brother Absalom has a big marker. Thus it is strongly believed that the large missing marker at Burning Tree Apts. was that of Thomas.

Therefore the cemetery should carry Thomas' name as it was his property and homeplace.

- This property may have been sold for a subdivision.
- Julie Gleaves sent a wagon to Fredericksburg, Va. to return her son's body home after he was killed in the Civil War battle.

Introduction and Navigating the Home Page


1. To begin in the browser address line, enter "GleavesFamily.com" and press the Enter key



2. This will open the Home page.



3. Here you can find current information for the web site. Scroll down to find the section, 'New Content Recently Added'



4. On the top of the page, you will see a listing of the web site sections



5. Place your cursor over the Family History selection and the items in this section will appear in a list. Hovering over each selection will show the details in that section. Note: Gallery, Links, Miscellaneous, and Contact do not have sub-menus.






6. Note that each page has a search box, powered by Google. We pay for this search, so use it.




7. When you feel completely lost and cannot find what you are looking for, then 'look under the hood; by clicking on 'View the site Map'.



8. This is what you will see:



9. Scroll down and you will see more of the site map



10. In this view when you find what you are looking for, just click on the item and you will jump to that screen.. To exit out of this view, either hit the browser back button or scroll all of the way to the bottom and the Home page will be displayed again.



Navigating the letters section of the web site

 Place your cursor over the Family History selection and the items in this section will appear in a list



2. Select the Letters & Diaries item, click and you will see this screen




- Scroll down and you will see the different items available in this section with a brief description.
- 4. Also notice on the left hand side these same items are listed again. This list will remain visible after you make a selection so you can quickly select a different category without using the back button.
- 5. Select a category for exploring and click. The letters written from 1820 through 1839 have been selected for this illustration. Note that the categories are still visible on the left hand side. On this screen you can scroll down to find a letter to view.


- The date, the subject, the author and the recipient of each letter is shown while the letters are listed in date order.
- When a date is followed by 'about', this indicates that the exact date is not known for the document and a best guess was made.
- A subject listed as 'Letter' followed by a number (the same number as the File #) indicates that this letter has not yet been transcribed and will not be found when a search is done on the site. When the letter is transcribed, the subject will be changed to the subject of the letter's content and the letter can be selected during a search. Even if a letter has not been transcribed, it can be selected for viewing (and for transcribing).
- The File # (right-most column) was assigned as each document was scanned. If there is a question about the document, this number should be included with the question as it will pin point the exact document being asked about. Remember multiple documents can have the same date, written by, etc, but the file # indicates a unique document.




- 6. After finding a letter to view, click anywhere on the highlighted line and a new window will open showing the letter image(s). Again note the category list is still available on the left. The heading for the letter shows the same information that was shown on the summary selection line as well as the transcriber.
- 7. Below this heading on the left, you will see a thumbnail image of each page of the letter. To its right will be the transcription. Up to five pages of a letter can be displayed on this screen. If there are more pages to the letter, they will be displayed on the next screen, which you can reach by clicking on 'Next Item' either at the top or bottom of the screen.



8. To view a larger image of the letter, click on the letter image and a larger resolution image will be viewable in a new tab




9. Clicking anywhere in this window will present an even larger view of the image. Use the bottom and/or right scroll bars to view all parts of the image. Clicking anywhere again in this window will return the image to the original size. You can click back and forth on the image to enlarge/decrease the image size as many times as you like. Once you have finished viewing this image, close the tab and return to the detail letter images.



10. Navigation available in this window:

- o The back browser button will return you to the previous screen
- The previous letter or the next letter may be viewed by using the 'Previous item'/'Next item' at the top or bottom of this window. The arrow is pointing to this option.
- The Category list on the left may be used to return to the same category or a new category.
- The 'bread crumbs' at the very top of the window, next to the lightening bolt, may be used to quickly 'jump back' to a 'higher' selection on the web path.



Other Useful Information

The Family History Section

This section contains all things associated with the Gleaves Family History.

In the <u>Obituaries section</u>, recent deaths are listed at the top of the section in the Current Year Obituaries. At the end of the current calendar year, these will be moved to the Prior Years Obituaries where they will be listed alphabetically. If you know of a recent death or find an old obituary of a family member, use the Contact page and sent it to the web master for posting.

The **Books section** contains the complete listings of the family history books written about the Gleaves. Today these consist of <u>Gleaves Families in Middle Tennessee</u> by Hilda Barnes and <u>Descendants of Matthew Glaves – The Glaves/Gleaves Family in America</u> by Dennis Glaves. Each book can be viewed by complete book or by chapter. The index of each book is also listed for quicker searching. After finding a person in the index, note the page numbers for the person. The chapter listings will show the page numbers included in that chapter. Using the page numbers from the index, the appropriate chapter(s) can be selected for opening. When using a chapter rather than the entire book, the response time and navigation will be quicker.

The <u>Letters & Diaries section</u> contains letters, ledgers, journals & diaries written by earlier Gleaves family members. If you have items to add that would be of interest and add to our understanding of our ancestors, use the Contact page and let the web master know.

The **<u>Documents</u>** section is a collection of documents relating to the family consisting of:

- Bibles
- Census Records
- Certificates: birth, marriage, death
- Military Records, such as WW1 and WW2 draft records, Civil War pension records
- Time Lines: contains the stories of family members lives as told by date and documents with the documents linked for viewing.

The <u>Cemeteries section</u> has listings and information about cemeteries where Gleaves are buried including the Gleaves buried there. Included in this section are:

- <u>Cemeteries by Grave Name</u> shows all of the grave names alphabetically that are included in the cemetery listings with a link to the cemetery detail.
- <u>Cemeteries by Alphabetic Name</u> shows all of the cemeteries listed in this section with a quick link to the cemetery detail.
- <u>Cemeteries by Location</u> shows first National and Military cemeteries and then cemeteries by state and county location.

- For each cemetery, the following may be listed:
 - Address of the cemetery
 - Directions to the cemetery
 - The Gleaves family graves in the cemetery, including name, birth date, death date, and family relationship
 - Notes on the cemetery
 - Directions via Google Maps and Google Street view of the cemetery entrance
 - Cemetery Relationships includes a family tree chart showing the family members in the cemetery and their relation to each other
 - Pictures of the cemetery and/or graves

<u>The Research section</u> contains stories, articles, and other types of research that add to our knowledge of the Gleaves

<u>The Resources section</u> lists places for researching the Gleaves Family and types of information contained there.

The Activities Section

Whereas the Family History section contains the history of the Gleaves family, the Activities section contains information for today's Gleaves family members.

The Business section contains information relating to the running of the Gleaves Family Association. Here you will find information about the association officers and their duties; business meeting minutes from the reunions and most importantly of all, financial reports. At the close of each month, the treasurer sends the web master the current financial report which is posted here with the previous months reports. If you want to see the financial status of the organization and how our money is being spent, this is the place to look.

<u>The Members section</u> highlights what is going on in the lives of today's members such as what they are doing, what they are interested in, and their accomplishments. This is your section to let us know about you. If you have a story of interest, use the Contact page to let the web master know and we will get it posted. When an item is first posted, it is highlighted on the Home page. After a period of time, the news will be maintained on this page.

The Reunions Section

Information for up coming reunions is listed in this section. Here you will find schedules, registration forms and information about the next reunion as it is being planned.

Also, you can find highlights, photos, stories, etc about previous reunions.

The Gallery Section

This section is a collection of different photo albums. It contains pictures of reunion attendees, cemetery work, collections of family photos. This is the place to share (and backup) all of the old family photos. Use the Contact page to let the webmaster know about photos you want to share so they can be added.

The Links Section


This section contains links to external web sites with information featuring the Gleaves family. If you have a personal or interesting web site that you think would be of interest of the Gleaves family, contact the web master.







Belisa, or as she was called by her sisters, Brr, or by her nieces & nephews, Aunt

Coxie, was the youngest daughter of Laura Keene and Charles Wythe Gleaves. She was well known for her sharp shooting skills. She had a wood working shop behind her family's home where she made footstools and this puzzle. The puzzle contains pictures of the family dogs that were very important to her. So important that her will read:

"I, Belisa Gleaves do make this my last will & testament. My pet dog Peggy or any pet that I may have is to be cared for by Alice M. Gleaves and Laura Keene Robinson,

with the assurance that the pet will not be put to death at their request. My dog Connie met that fate. Laura Keene Robinson is to have my stock in the First National Farmers Bank, of Wytheville, Va. which will repay her for the hospital accounts she paid for me in Dallas, Texas.

All of my other property both real and personal is to be divided equally between Alice M. Gleaves and Laura Keene Robinson and I appoint either or both of them my Extrix. My shop building and contents are to be sold and building moved off of the lot owned by Alice M. Gleaves.

If my sisters Alice M. Gleaves and Laura Keene Robinson do not want to care for Peggy I leave what I have with the exception of the First National Farmers Bank stock to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals and they are to care for her. (Peggy)



Gleaves Silverware

The two youngest daughters of Robert Harvey Gleaves, Ruth Gleaves (1892 – 1981) and Josephine 'Tom' Gleaves (1896 – 1985) were school teachers in Richmond, Virginia, and never married. After they retired, they bought a house together in Wytheville where they lived until their deaths. They left their house to their nephew, Jim Dunkley (1914 – 2009), son of their older sister Jessie Gleaves Dunkley (1884 – 1960). After he died, his children cleaned out the house, spruced it up and sold it.

While cleaning out the house, they found this silverware and decided to donate it to the Gleaves Family Association for the reunion auction. On the attached spreadsheet is information found from searching the Internet for the silverware pieces based on their markings and patterns. Since many of the pieces date from the early 1900s into the 1920s, it is possible that the sisters purchased these pieces when they were setting up their apartments at the beginning of their careers.


