

It is a painful duty to record the death of Mrs. Emma M. Addington, wife of our townsman, Mr. J. D. The funeral of Mrs. Emma A., wife of Mr. James D. Addington, whose death has been announced in a previous issue, took place at 3:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon from St. Paul's P. E. Church, of which the deceased had been a constant member. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. A. S. Lloyd, rector of St. Luke's Church, in the presence of a large congregation, conspicuous in which was Pickett-Buchanan Camp, Confederate Veterans; the Ladies' Memorial Auxiliary of the Camp and the Children's Aid Society of St. Paul's Church. The remains were interred in Cedar Grove Cemetery, and were followed to the grave by a long procession, of which the organizations mentioned formed a part.
