

### ABOUT THE AUTHOR

A lifetime of living in Davidson County, Tennessee - having been born at Hermitage, Tennessee which was also the home of the earliest Gleaves families - she was born in November, 1922, the daughter of Emmett G. Hagar and Nova Jenkins Hagar.

Her earliest Hagar family came to Davidson County in 1810, only a few years after Thomas Harvey Gleaves arrived and they lived within a couple of miles of each other. Hilda attended public schools, graduating from Donelson High School. She has been a

#### THE GLEAVES FAMILY

Much has already been written about the Gleaves Family. Dennis Glaves, a Vietnam Veteran, has meticulously compiled a book 'The Descendants of Matthew Glave – the Glaves/Gleaves Family in America'. For more on this work refer to the Gleaves Family Association website found at www.GleavesFamily.com.

This is an incomplete record of this family...researched by this writer over the past several years. Due to writer's age, no further research is to be made.

Dr. E. L. Gleaves' letter of June 2, 1925, detailing information relayed to him by J. Miller Turner, deceased, was the first of the records accumulated over the years. <sup>1</sup>

# LETTER of JUNE 2, 1925<sup>2</sup> (by J. MILLER TURNER ...facts from Dr. Edgar Lee Gleaves<sup>3</sup>)

The original family by the name of **GLEAVES** came from Willingham<sup>4</sup>, England to America the exact date being unknown. Several years prior to the Colonial War, they settled in Virginia near Roanoke, where several descendants still live. The first one of the family to come to <u>Tennessee</u> was **MIKE GLEAVES**<sub>1</sub><sup>5</sup> (**MICHAEL**) who came to the Boone Settlement in Northern Kentucky, from there to Mansker's Fort situated about 14 miles north of what is now Nashville, Tennessee. The Fort was built in the fork of a stockade on Mansker's Creek at a large spring on what is now the boundary line between Davidson & Sumner Counties, about one and one-half miles northeast of Cumberland River. This settlement was under the command of Captain Donelson. There was also at this fort a Dr. Sam Johnson, noted frontiersman of that date. **MIKE GLEAVES**<sub>1</sub> at that time entered the Colonial Army and fought at the Battle of Kings Mountain in 1780, after which he returned to Fort Mansker with his 2 negro servants and there married a lady named **RACHEL**, last name unknown to the writer. marriage was in <u>1788</u>. Of this union there were born 5 children - 4 sons and 1 daughter. All born at Fort Mansker. They were:

Thomas Gleaves<sub>2</sub> - 1789

Michael Gleaves<sub>2</sub> - 1791

Mathew Gleaves<sub>4</sub> - 1793

William Gleaves - 1795

given name of daughter not known - born 1797<sup>6</sup>

MIKE GLEAVES<sub>1</sub> left Fort Mansker with his family and secured land Grant No. 26 to 640 acres across the Cumberland River from Fort Mansker in what is known as the Jones-Hadley Bend, now occupied by the Powder Plant<sup>7</sup>, after that known as Old Hickory and being the site of the DuPont Rayon and Cellophane Plants. On this 640 acres is located the <u>FAMILY BURYING GROUND<sup>8</sup></u>, where he and his wife are buried. He also bought 640 acres adjoining him, and at a Sheriff's sale purchased another 100 acres, giving him a total of 1300 acres. He was a wealthy man at that date. He was one of the first seven men to pay taxes in Davidson County in the year 1791. The date of his death is not known to the writer. <sup>9</sup>

THOMAS GLEAVES<sub>2</sub>, son of Mike Gleaves<sub>1</sub> died (age & date unknown)<sup>10</sup>, leaving 2 sons: William (A). Gleaves II, and Albert Gleaves<sub>1</sub>. William Gleaves II was connected in an official capacity with the N.C. & St. L. Railroad for a number of years. He lived in a house that is built at the corner of Church St., & McNairy - now occupied by a Catholic School. He left one son, James C. (or E.) Gleaves, who lives on Rosebank Ave., East Nashville and who did not marry 11 and the other one. Albert Gleaves<sub>1</sub> was a bookkeeper. The latter had 1 son and 2 daughters<sup>12</sup>. The son, ALBERT GLEAVES<sub>2</sub> entered the United States Navy. He served as an Admiral during World War I and was very successful in protecting and guarding convoys of troops from America to France. He was presented a gold sword at the Ryman Auditorium in Nashville, Tennessee by the Mothers of Tennessee Soldiers in appreciation of his services. He is now a Rear Admiral, Retired. A bronze bust by Mrs. Belle Henry, sculptress, now stands in the State Capitol in Nashville. He resides in Washington D. C. with his wife and they have 2 daughters: Mrs. Thomas VanMetre<sup>13</sup> and Mrs. Albert Cohn<sup>14</sup>. His wife is Mrs. Evalina Heap Gleaves<sup>15</sup>. Albert Gleaves II's two sisters, Mrs. Corinne Eastman, <sup>16</sup> a widow, has 1 daughter, Mrs. E. P. Anderson<sup>17</sup>, wife of a Methodist preacher and bishop, who now lives in Nashville, and Miss Fannie Gleaves, who also lives in Nashville. Mrs. Corinne Eastman taught in Nashville Schools for over 49 years.

MIKE GLEAVES<sub>2</sub>, age unknown, died<sup>18</sup> leaving 1 son and 3 daughters. The son, John E. Gleaves<sup>19</sup>, was a lawyer and served as Clerk and Master of Davidson County for a long period of time; he died leaving a widow<sup>20</sup> and 3 daughters. The widow later married a preacher by the name of Hoyte. One daughter, Hattie, married Richard Mason. They still live in Nashville. One daughter, Birdosa (?) married a Dr. E. D. (or D. E.) Patterson. Their daughter, Nellie<sup>21</sup>, married Carrol Vance. The third daughter<sup>22</sup> married Dr. E. B. Stevenson, and they have 1 son, E. B. Stevenson, Jr. of Nashville. The eldest daughter of Mike Gleaves<sub>2</sub> married her cousin, Mike Gleaves<sub>3</sub>, a son of William D. Gleaves<sub>1</sub>. She was the writer's grandmother. She died in 1881, age 79, and is buried at the family burying ground in Jones' Bend<sup>23</sup> by the side of her husband. Her name was Mary DEAN Gleaves<sup>24</sup>. Her name was Mary Ann Gleaves Gleaves.....note that Thomas Gleaves married Mary Dean. The second daughter of Mike Gleaves (Sally) married a Dr. Kimball and moved to California in 1849. Her descendants still live in Los Angeles. The third daughter of Mike Gleaves<sub>2</sub> (Sophia) married a Mr. Young and moved to Sherman, Texas. Mr. Young helped build Fort Sill, Oklahoma. He visited the writer's home in 1879. He died, leaving 2 sons and 1 daughter, who (at last reports) still lived in Sherman, Texas.

**MATTHEW GLEAVES**<sub>4</sub><sup>25</sup> died, age unknown, leaving 3 daughters. One married a Mr. Goodletts, one a Mr. Turner and one a Mr. Williams. The latter's descendants still live in Nashville. The late **Major Albert Williams**, was a grandson.

WILLIAM GLEAVES<sup>26</sup> the fourth son of MIKE GLEAVES<sub>1</sub>, died leaving 1 son, Mike Gleaves<sub>3</sub> and 2 daughters<sup>27</sup>. He was buried in the family burial ground in <u>Jones' Bend</u><sup>23</sup>. He was a large landowner and slave owner.

**MIKE GLEAVES<sub>3</sub>** (**Michael H**.) died about 1856<sup>28</sup>, age 45, died of congestive chill, being sick only 1 day. He, too, was buried in the family ground in <u>Jones' Bend</u><sup>23</sup>. He left a widow<sup>29</sup> and 8 children. Out of 16 children born to him and wife, his living children were named:

The only daughter<sup>31</sup> of **MIKE GLEAVES<sub>1</sub>** married a Mr. Carroll<sup>32</sup> who located in Wilson County, Tennessee Her date of death is unknown. They had only l child, a son, who never married but when he died, he willed Vanderbilt University \$27,800.00. At his death this branch of the family ended. <sup>33</sup>

One daughter<sup>34</sup> of **WILLIAM D. GLEAVES** married a Mr. Smith<sup>35</sup> and died leaving no children.<sup>36</sup> The other daughter<sup>37</sup> married a Mr. Turner<sup>38</sup> of Jones' Bend. She died leaving 4 sons and 2 daughters<sup>39</sup>. One of the daughters married a Mr. **Abston** and they moved to Ft. Worth. The daughter who went to Ft. Worth left several children. The other daughter<sup>40</sup> married a **Mr. Weaver<sup>41</sup>** of Jones Bend and died leaving 1 daughter<sup>42</sup>, who in turn married a Mr. **Wilhoit<sup>43</sup>**. One son died in Memphis, Tennessee leaving children. Another son, **Irve? Turner<sup>44</sup>** left children; Another, **Richard<sup>45</sup>**, died without heirs; and the other son, **J. M. Turner<sup>46</sup>**, with whom the writer was very intimate, died in April 1925, age 87 years of Paranoia near Nashville, leaving a widow, 2 sons and 1 daughter. He owned and lived on a large farm in the Jones' Bend Section of Davidson County, Tennessee His children were **J. M. Turner, Jr**; **Keelin? Turner** and **Betty Hooper Turner**, all still living in Nashville.

I. **WILLIAM M.** (**MICHAEL**) **GLEAVES**<sub>4</sub>, eldest living son of **MIKE GLEAVES**<sub>3</sub>. He was born Nov. 4, 1834 and died in 1911, age 76 years. He married in 1861 to **Miss Sarah Moore Sarver** of Sumner County, Tenn, a daughter of Alfred Sarver. She was a grand-niece of Bishop Wm? McKendrie for whom the McKendree Methodist Church of Nashville was named. She was born 4/6/1844 died 4/14/1905. Husband & Wife are buried in the Sarver Family Burial Grounds<sup>47</sup>, in Sumner County, Tennessee (District 17). Of this union there were born 9 children, 6 still living<sup>48</sup>:

Served in France in 89<sup>th</sup> Aero? Squadron. After returning, he re-entered the Vanderbilt Law School, winning the Founder's Medal in Oratory; and then graduated from the Yale Law School in New Haven, Conn. In 1922; was elected to the Tennessee House of Rep. from Davidson County, in 1925 and again in 1927; served 2 years as Asst. Atty. General of Davidson County and 3 years as Asst. City Atty., and is now practicing Law in Nashville. He married Miss Carolyn Jones of Nashville in 1928. They have 1 son, Richard D. #### James T. Gleaves Letter

Another letter came to my attention (perhaps thru the descendants of **Clyde M. Gleaves**)... from Mr. **James T. 'Jim T.' Gleaves** - (written when he was 88 years of age).

As a child and young girl<sup>53</sup>, I knew '**JIM T**.' as he was affectionately known in the Hermitage, Tennessee Community. Little did I know he was related to me. But I might have known he was, as so many people in the community were related to my father's or my mother's people...and the fact my mother called all the Gleaves 'cuzzins'. My great-grandmother was **Martha Ann Virginia Gleaves Jenkins**, daughter of **James Robertson Gleaves**. Jim T's father was **Robert Hughes Gleaves**, Martha Ann's brother (also a son of **James Robertson Gleaves**.). Much of the land my father owned and farmed was purchased from Gleaves families or heirs.

Sept. 28, 1933

TO: Mr. Clyde M. Gleaves<sup>54</sup> FROM: James T. Gleaves<sup>55</sup>

#### Dear Clyde:

As per your request thru Bennie Bright, I will try to write you up a 'Family Tree', as best I can. I may make some errors, as my memory has become somewhat treacherous. I am not able to tell you much about the BROOKS family, your maternal ancestors. As I remember, your grandfather, Mose Brooks, Sr. had 2 sons, James and Joe Brooks, and I think, 3 daughters, Mollie Creel, John Lloyd's wife, whose given name I have forgotten, and Alice, your mother.

Regarding the **GLEAVES** family, I will state that your great-great-grandfather, **Thomas Gleaves**, was married in the year 1785<sup>56</sup> to a daughter of **Felix Robertson**, who was a brother of **James Robertson**, the founder of Nashville, Tennessee. **Felix Robertson** was a lawyer, statesman and philanthropist, a great and noted man.

**SARAH CATHERINE LOUISIANA GLEAVES** born Jan. 8, 1845. Married **D. R. Humble.** Fruit: 1 daughter, now dead.

I will now tell you something of the **BAKER** side of your ancestry, which I think will interest you. **James Baker**, my grandfather, (your great grandfather) was born in North Carolina, Dec. 10, 1788 and died in the 4<sup>th</sup> District of Davidson County, Tenn, Nov. 7, 1866. He married **Annie Sanders**, who was born in South Carolina, May 7, 1792 and died in Davidson County, Tennessee, Nov. 27, 1890.

**James (Baker)** while a young man, bought a mule of some one who lived in S. C. The said mule broke out of the pasture and made his way back to the place of his nativity. James made a trip down there on hunt of his mule. While in S. C. he stopped one night with a Mr. Sanders, who had an attractive daughter named Annie. He fell desperately in love with said Annie and subsequently married her. They decided to come to Tennessee, which was then a new country.

They had a little money, but not enough to buy another horse to go with the one they had, so granddaddy 'hoofed it', his wife riding the horse, all the way from S. C. to Nashville, Tennessee They landed in Nashville with only \$40 and the horse. They rented a farm near what is known as Flat Rock, on the Murfreesboro Pike, not very far from what is now Antioch. The farm was a very fertile one, but had no house on it except a little log cabin with no floor - the whole earth was the only floor. They drove forks in the ground, put poles in the forks, and in cracks of the walls, thus making bed stead on

which they put straw for a mattress. They had 1 stew pot, and a skillet, which constituted their cooking vessels. Having no plates, they both ate from the cooking vessels, with only a pocket knife and a wooden fork.

The old man made bumper crop that year and in a few years made money and bought the farm. Subsequently he swapped this farm for the one on Stones River, where he lived the balance of his days. In swapping farms, he received a pony and a silk bandana handkerchief to boot. The handkerchief was about 30 inches square, and in those days considered valuable, worth some \$20 to \$25.

They raised 11 children, 3 sons and 8 daughters:

- **8.** Mary T. (my mother) born June 15, 1826
- 9. Elizabeth, born 1828, married John E. Wright
- 10. Emily, born 1829, died before grown
- 11. Delilah, born 1831, married William C. Gleaves.

These have all passed away.

William D. Baker reared 8 children, all dead except Howell, who resides at Watertown, Tennessee. He is the father of Robert H. Baker, who was Highway commissioner under Horton's administration. He has 1 daughter in Mt. Juliet, the wife of Bro. Howard McFarlin. Each of grandfather Baker's children raised families, but most of them are dead.

Uncle Billie, as I above stated, has 1 living child, Howell Baker.

Jefferson never married.

Aunt Rose Anna had 4 sons, all dead but one. And 2 daughters, both dead.

Uncle Frank has 5 boys, all dead. 6 girls - all dead but 1. **Charity**, now 91 years old.

Aunt Nancy Evans had 1 son and 6 girls - 3 girls are living.

Aunt **Sarah Ballentine** had 2 girls and 5 boys - all dead.

Mary my mother, 1 girl and 2 sons., I the only living one.

Aunt Lizzie Wright had 1 son and 2 girls. One girl living.

Aunt **Delilah Gleaves**, 3 girls and 1 son - The son still lives.

I believe this is about all that is necessary for me to say. If I have left out any point that you would like to have, write me, and if possible I will attend to it.

I might add that Old Grandfather Baker had 3 brothers who followed him to Tennessee viz: William, Hiram and John. William and John did well - raised families and accumulated nice property. Hiram did no good and died a pauper. Uncle John was killed by Federal Soldiers during the Civil War - while guarding his watermelon patch. I might also tell you that both my grandfather and grandmother (Bakers) met tragic deaths. The old man was fox hunting, he went through a gate, his stirrup caught on the latch, the horse jumped, broke the girth and threw him, which subsequently resulted in death. Grandmother stepped on a corn cob which rolled and threw her against stair steps, which afterwards resulted in death. You will note that Granddaddy Baker died age 77 yrs. 6 mo. and 22 days. Grandmother Baker died aged 98 years, 6 months and 29 days.

#### **DEAR CLYDE:**

In writing about the Gleaves Family, I forgot to tell you that **James R. Gleaves**, my grandfather, had 2 sisters. <sup>64</sup> **Emiline** and **Elizabeth**.

**Emiline** married old man **Jimmie Wright**, who owned and lived on a farm just west of your grandfather Brooks. She had no children.

**Elizabeth**<sup>65</sup> married a Mr. **Hill** and moved to Arkansas. She had 2 sons, **William** and **Felix**, one daughter **Minervia** 

, who married Filander Owen, and raised 2 sons and two daughters.

Grandmother Baker had 2 sisters who came West after grandfather & wife came. One of her sisters, **Nancy**, married **Hiram Baker**, a brother of Grandfather Baker. The other sister, whose name I have forgotten, married some man in Huntsville, Ala. I have forgotten his name. Grandmother & Grandfather used to make a trip on horseback once in a while to Huntsville to visit her sister. These trips were made before her family grew to be so large.

How would it look now to see a woman start out horseback on such a trip? People would pronounce her crazy.

### **Gleaves Family Explained**

# How is the Michael Gleaves family related to 'other' Gleaves families in Davidson County, Tennessee?

It is known for a certainty that one **Thomas Gleaves** came into Davidson County from Virginia in 1797 (married **Sallie Smith**). He was the son of **William B. Gleaves** (born abt. 1748) & **Elizabeth Turk Gleaves** of Wythe County, Virginia.

The following may be the ancestry of both William B. Gleaves (born 1740/48) & Michael Gleaves<sub>1</sub>:

Several researchers have been actively looking for answers to the Gleaves Heritage. There are variations in some of their findings.

June Novick<sup>72</sup> shows dates of birth of above as:

Matthew<sub>1</sub>: born about 1710; d. abt. 1760

(wife, Esther Mitchell born abt. 1720; died abt. 1808)

Mary: born Jun 12, 1746

William B.: born about 1748; died May 1820, Wythe County, Virginia.

Matthew<sub>2</sub>: born about 1750; died abt. 1771 (see below)

Esther: born about 1754 Elizabeth: born about 1758

**Michael**<sub>1</sub> born about 1760; married abt.1788; died about 1814<sup>73</sup>

Chalkey II, page 400 'Fee book of 1760'. **William Gleaves** states in Bill of Complaint that <u>his father</u> died in 1760; **William** was appointed guardian for **Esther <u>Glaves</u>**, orphan of **Matthew**, <u>dec.</u> (Chalkey I, page 163)<sup>74</sup>

Chalkey I, page 402: 'Matthew<sup>75</sup> apprenticed to John Finley Jan. 24, 1775<sup>,76</sup>

Note from ? - 'Matthew Gleaves<sup>77</sup> assigns John Marley, a servant from Ireland on the (ship) Snow George - to serve 4 yrs. from Sept. 22 – Date Oct. 9, 1745'

#### BY HILDA H. BARNES: My thinking at present:

1. **William (B.) Gleaves** was a son of **Matthew<sub>1</sub> & Esther** (and a grandson of **THOMAS**). William died in Virginia in 1820. *THREE* of his sons, **THOMAS<sub>1</sub>** (born March 18, 1771); **MATTHEW<sub>3</sub>** (born Nov. 9, 1772) and **ABSALOM** (born Sept. 5, 1781) came to Tennessee & settled in the Hermitage, Tennessee area - not too many miles from the Jones' Bend where their *UNCLE*, **Michael<sub>1</sub>** had already settled (all in Davidson County). Brothers **Thomas<sub>1</sub>** and **Absalom** were prominent in the Hermitage area, settling around what is known in 2004 as the Central Pike – Old Hickory Blvd. area. (The other 2 sons, **William**, (born 1777- died before 1820) and **James Turk Gleaves** (born 1788) did

<u>not</u> move to Tennessee. It is known that **Thomas<sub>1</sub>** (born March 18, 1771) married in Davidson County, on March 13, 1797 and his brother **Absalom** married in Wythe County, Virginia, Aug. 18, 1803.

<u>NOTE</u>: William (B.) Gleaves (born 1740-48)<sup>78</sup> gave two of his sons the names of: **THOMAS**<sub>1</sub> (born March 18, 1771) and **MATTHEW**<sub>3</sub> (born Nov. 9, 1772 and died in Davidson County, Tennessee abt. Jan. 1805).

2. **Michael Gleaves**<sub>1</sub> –also a son of **Matthew**<sub>1</sub> & **Esther** and William (B's) brother - born ca 1760(??) came to Tennessee-PERHAPS as early as 1788 –settling in Jones' Bend - died in Davidson County, in 1811.

<u>NOTE</u>: Michael Gleaves<sub>1</sub> also named two of his sons **THOMAS**<sub>2</sub> (born ca 1789) and **MATTHEW**<sub>4</sub> (born abt. 1793 and married at the time of his father's will in 1811).

This is an example of 2 brothers - giving their sons the names of their grandfather & great-grandfather. What difference could it make if they had similar names? **William** lived in Virginia and **Michael**<sub>1</sub> in Tennessee. There was probably little communication. And the children would probably never know each other – living so far away. How wrong they were!! These 'cousins' spent the greater part of their lives in the same general area.

There is little doubt in my mind of the relationship of the first **Matthew**<sub>1</sub> (1725); the first **Michael**<sub>1</sub> (1754); the first **Thomas**<sub>1</sub> (1771), - to the first William(1748). Quite a bit of information has been assembled on **William**'s line thru his sons **Thomas**<sub>1</sub>, **Matthew**<sub>3</sub> and **Absalom**. Only the first generation of the families of **William**, **Jr**. (Sept. 22, 1777) and **James Turk Gleaves** (Feb. 26, 1788) has been assembled.

An attempt will be made to outline my accumulation of Gleaves information. If I infringe upon information from Dennis Glaves or others, I will attempt to credit them.
